CEO'S MESSAGE

Looking back, we are grateful for another significant year for Life Community.

Our People

We started the year with a staff retreat to a slightly further part of Johor Bahru – Kukup where we brought 60 staff for a time of bonding and relaxation. We are happy to be

able to progress in this aspect taking of of care our people. The staff have worked hard all year round to help the needy and they deserve a break away from the demands of work and have a bit of relaxation. Nothing extravagant but



meaningful in many ways such as taking a road trip together, seeing a bit of the fishing village in kelong setting, and writing our collective dreams on a lantern and sending it flying up the sky.



Meeting Societal Needs

Societal needs are ever changing, putting pace of change aside, the stories behind the lives we support, are heart-wrenching and sometimes the pains and struggles the children go through are beyond logical comprehension. As a voluntary welfare organisation, Life Community is thankful to be able to lend a helping hand to these little ones, to continue to provide the support they need while growing up.

Our Donors

Donors continue to be generous in their financial support, and we have been able to raise around \$1.2 million for our 15/16 financial year. This is matched \$1 to \$1 under the Care & Share Movement in celebration of Singapore's 50th birthday. We are grateful to report that Life Community was named one of the four beneficiary charities of Deutsche Bank's Donate a Day programme 2015. It was significant not just for the amount of over \$260,000 raised but it also marked the growing and continuing partnership between Deutsche Bank and Life Community for the past five years. Another faithful donor is Noel Gifts International who celebrated its 40th birthday in a meaningful way by donating \$100,000 to each of its five charity partners. We do not take things for granted, we know and is fully conscious that every dollar and cent is a representation of their love to reach out to those who are in need. These CSR investments alongside many other donations have helped to position Life Community for greater works in supporting the less advantaged in our community.

Friends of Children & Friend of Youth Program

The Friends of Children and Friends of Youth programmes continue to reach out to the children whose parent/s who are presently or formerly incarcerated. This group of children faces the emotional stigma of being a child of an offender. They have inferiority complexes, and often think and believe that they are the cause of their parent/s incarceration even though they have never committed a crime in their lives. Studies have shown that children join gangs for a sense of belonging. If these children are not helped in time and get into bad company, this may mark the start of a possibly irreversible spiral down journey. Statistics have also shown that children of incarcerated parents are five times more likely to get into trouble with the law. Thus the social investment in Life Community will help to provide an upstream intervention, to stop the proliferation of the offending cycle.

MightyKids. Families & Community Program

After giving a face-lift to our drop-in centre at Telok Blangah for latch-key/ community children, our MightyKFC reopened its doors by organising a Community Day. We were glad to be able to bring together a total of 14 corporations, schools and vendors to bless the community in Radin Mas. A total of 104 volunteers participated in providing the very interesting carnival stalls, food, decorations and prizes. Everyone was excited to do their part for the community, bringing a new lease of life and vibrancy to this matured estate.

We were honoured to have the MP for Radin Mas SMC, Mr Sam Tan and 8 grassroot leaders to grace this community carnival. There were 194 registered visitors and 24 LCSS staff and board members. Most of the visitors are first time visiting our Activity Centre. The door has been opened for new enrolments into our program.

EduGrow for Brighter Tomorrows

We are pleased to report the launch of our new program — EduGrow for Brighter Tomorrows, in August 2015. This family-centric joint project with WeCare@ Marine Parade adopts a relational approach where community mentors are matched to the child, supporting their aspirational, character, education, financial and relational growth with the aim of improving the social mobility of these children. As at 31 March 2016, 24 children have been matched with 23 community mentors, and the pilot programme is moving at a good pace. Our projection is to be able to have another 40 new mentors matched to 40 children by March 2017.

Life Student Care Centres

As at 31st March 2016, there is a total enrolment of 381 students from our 4 Centres, an increase of 2% from last financial year. Supporting the community needs of the children and families remain our priority as we ensure that the children have a safe, and homely environment to return to after school hours. Teachers and supporting staff members are trained to provide a loving and caring environment while supervising their homework as well as the children's overall well-being including character development.

Our Volunteers

While we believe parents hold the primary responsibility in raising their children and will continue to advocate and work towards building strong families, there are many children in our program who lack a positive adult figure in their lives. As such, we have introduced befrienders and volunteer mentors program for the children. These befrienders and volunteer mentors act as role-models for the children, and support them in their learning journey. In order to ensure a good fit, we conduct interviews and reference checks, and run a systematic process in the recruitment, training and development and retention of our befrienders and volunteer mentors. This is an area where Life Community will continue to put more emphasis as we see this as a sustainable way forward to reach out to more needy children and families.

20 Years' Commemoration



Incarcerated Parent's Profile

Majority of our clients are being referred to us from Family Resource Centre (Changi Prison). Other referral sources include NUH, FSCs and other VWOs. Some of the incarcerated parents have either been released or released on Home Tagging scheme. The latter scheme permits inmates to serve their sentence outside of Prison but are subjected to wearing a tag (ankle) and to abide strictly to the curfew and reporting back to officers.

Our incarcerated parents comprise mainly of drug related offence (84%) and (16%) are convicted for other crimes such as being members of secret society, and some being involved in illegal money lending, sex related offences or petty crimes (theft & robbery).

a. Volunteers' Profiles

As of 31 March 2016, there are 124 volunteers, comprising working professionals and tertiary students, both single and married who have signed up to be Children's Befriender, Ad-hoc volunteers, tutors, event committee & fund raising volunteers. There are also a number of volunteers who have withdrawn from the programme in view of personal issues, work or study commitments.

b. Volunteers' Training

All volunteers must attend a 2-hour Learn & Share (L&S) session. In this session, we share with potential volunteers on challenges in handling children and the impact of parental incarceration.

Besides L&S session, we organize at least three Befriender Sessions per year to



equip and empower our volunteers as well as an appreciation lunch/dinner for them. We also bring in trainers to equip befrienders and support them in their befriending journey with our children.

We had a lively and engaging training session, addressing the welfare needs of befrienders.

c. Assignment & Update of Child's Status

An introduction between client and befriender would be arranged by staff at client's home. Befriender would have to submit a monthly update. This update tracks the progress between the befriender and child. In this reporting year, we have matched 46 clients (up to age 15 years old) to 55 volunteers, either as an individual or as a couple.

d. Monthly Food Ration

Basic food ration packs were distributed to our beneficiaries during our monthly home visitation to each family. As of March 2016, a total of 66 families have benefitted from our food ration support.


f. Friends of Youth (FOY) Programme

We kicked off FOY's Growth program beginning of the first quarter of 2016. This program is a Character Development Program focused on the understanding, application and commitment to a set of values. We started off with values such as Faith, Faithfulness and Respect. We hope to emphasize these values through activities, games and experiential learning. Our objectives for the youth were:-

- a) Discover their purpose in life.
- b) Learn what it means and how to be faithful.
- c) Acknowledge and obey authority.



Year-End Christmas Party – "Return of the Superheroes"



220 children and youth, volunteers, staff and LCSS' board members attended our annual Friends of Children and Youth Christmas party on a Saturday, 21 November 2015.

With the theme "Return of the Superheroes", our children/youth learned positive traits of the Superhero characters through activities and game stations during the event. One of the main highlights of the event for our children/youth was meeting their "Superheroes" in person.

In line with the SG50 celebrations, we have included a "Palm Print Station" at our preevent activity. Children and youth who arrive early to the event will have their palm printed onto three white canvas with the words "Love, Joy and Hope". This piece of artwork with children and youth's palm prints on the canvas is displayed prominently at our Activity Centre in KLP.







We played a short video run by Comchest titled "Ripple" for the children and youth. The video featured on "paying forward", encouraging our children/youth to show kindness to the people around them.

IFGF took the lead in planning and executing the youth segment at our annual Christmas party. The youths participated in games that brought out the superheroes' characteristics in them. A volunteer from IFGF shared his testimony about how he overcome his difficult childhood. The segment ended with the volunteers singing the song "We're The World" to the youths. The song was about making right choices to make the world a better place.

Each child was presented with a Smiggle school bag to bring home for this festive season. IFGF sponsored each youth a Herschel school bag.

A family of four siblings put up a special Indian dance performance at our event. They received overwhelming applause from the audience.



g. Activity Centre in Kallang Leisure Park (KLP)

On-going regular dance practices have been carried out in our KLP Activity Centre for our dance interest group. We have also started a group tuition program in September 2015 for our beneficiaries who are sitting for their PSLE. 8 children benefitted from this program in 2015.

Besides the interest group activities, the centre is also used for regular Saturday Growth program as well as holiday events in collaboration with our corporate partners. The KLP Activity centre is also frequently used as a training ground for recruitment, training and equipping of staff and volunteers.

h. FOC & Y Success Story



Taking a long walk with the children

Shawn joined FOC in 2007. He was 8 years old then. Initially, Shawn likes material gifts. Whenever the caseworker visited him, he would ask them for candies and other gifts such as a bag and a bicycle. The candies that he asked for are expensive. Shawn does not display civic-mindedness as well. He threw rubbish on the floor without thinking twice.

Through regular visitation and mentoring, the caseworker, imparted the value of budgeting to Shawn. The caseworker also talked to Shawn about values and teaching him right

from wrong. A befriender was also attached to him as an additional role model.

Shawn is 17 years old this year. He has become more responsible and sensible. Despite preparing for his N levels, he assisted his family financially by juggling work and studies. He worked every evening in order to provide for the family. When he receives his pay, he gave most of it to his brother and mother. He is thrifty and only spends on things which are necessary. His mother depends on him, not just financially, but also to care for his younger brother. He has been very resilient despite the stress and responsibility he has to bear. Furthermore, he is caring and thoughtful to the people around him.

i. Case Study



Shah

Background:

Shah is 16 years old boy. When he was referred to Life Community, both his parents were incarcerated due to drug possession, consumption and trafficking.

Shah was placed in the care of his extended family. However, due to family conflict, Shah left home and was placed in the state's custody under MSF's child protection.

Shah has identity issues and professes to be a transgender. This has led to Shah living a life where he is bullied and stigmatised and thus, has to fight for himself in life. Living in institutional care was extremely stressful for him. He has absconded on several occasions as well as attempt suicide.

In addition, Shah has dropped out of school and is currently unemployed.

His sexuality choice is a disappointment to his mum.

Our Care and Intervention:

Shah has shared his thoughts on suicide on many occasions. He is open to discussing these struggles with the caseworker. His thoughts are often related to his gender choice and the struggles that come with it. As such, Shah was informed of services for help for transgender issues.

To meaningfully engage Shah, he was also registered with Youth Employment and Advancement Hub (YEAH!) programme to gain vocational skills and employment. This was necessary to support himself and mum as he matures and assists to support his mum financially upon her release in February 2016.

Upon Mother's release, their home was furnished with donated items through Life Community's contacts. Life Community also recommended his mother to employment opportunities. To further assist both Shah and his mum, they were put in contact with other community resources such as the SSO and FSC for financial support and to cope with parenting skills respectively. Reintegration work with mother, son and the family is ongoing as mother adapts to her life, freedom and responsibilities of being a single parent.

1.3.2 MIGHTYKIDS, FAMILIES & COMMUNITY



MightyKids, Families & Community is a community programme that believes in the potential and value of every child and the importance of the family unit as foundational to the growth and progress of the community.

d. NURTURING MIGHTYKIDS

Looking Beyond the Surface

In the Animation class, the children produced a video entitled, "Don't judge a book by its cover". The story portrays Gabriel, a boy who is overweight and often seen snoozing away, thus earning the jeers of his friends as being "fat and lazy"; until one day they saw him rescuing a kitten in distress. The perception of his friends took a hundred and eighty degrees turn. Their eyes were opened to see the compassionate side of Gabriel and Gabriel was applauded and hailed as a "hero".

This video so aptly reflects the kind of mindset we are to have in social work. Often times we have to enter into the child's world to empathise with the emotional turmoil and adverse effects of a dysfunctional family environment. Indeed, don't judge a child by his or her external appearance or behaviour. The root cause of rebellious behaviour could be due to some past emotional hurts not dealt with. The child could be a victim of circumstances that are beyond his control.

We are here to lend a helping hand to pull the child up and walk the journey of recovery with him.

Affirmation with Positive Reinforcement

Jack,12 years old, grew up in a single-parent home together with his 2 other siblings and frail grandparents, staying in a one room, one hall rental flat. Being the sole

provider for the household of six, his divorced mother worked long hours in a restaurant.

Diagnosed as a ADHD child by his school counsellor, Jack has short attention span, is easily distracted and is difficult to engage. Emotionally he bears the scars of hurt and anger at being abandoned by his father. He is easily provoked and flares up at the slightest sense of injustice.


During mentoring sessions, our staff helped Jack to process his emotions. He responded well to our therapeutic approach and became more open to share his coping methods in managing his anger and disappointments. The StarKid award gave Jack

the motivation to rekindle an interest in reading, concentrate on his studies, and be able to complete an assigned task and carry out his responsibilities dutifully.

At MightyKFC we celebrate every small step of improvement that a child makes. Jack's self-esteem was greatly boosted when he was selected as StarKid of the month. His school teacher happened to drop by our centre and saw the photo of Jack receiving his Starkid award. She turned to him and affirmed, "Jack, you have it in you; You can do it if you try."

Similarly, there are so many children like Jack whose potential and intrinsic values are waiting to be discovered and realised through proper guidance and mentoring.

Journeying from Despair to Hope



Andy, first came to MightyKFC when he was 10. He was a quiet and shy boy having just lost his mother to cancer during the period of his attendance at our centre. In the midst of his grief, he often felt sad and lonely, crying whenever he thought of his mother.

His father works as a lorry driver for a construction company and would leave for work before Andy wakes up. Due to his hectic work schedule, he was unable to be around whenever Andy returns home from school.

Each day for Andy, was often filled with loneliness and despair due to the lack of friends. Here at MightyKFC, he found a place of refuge and comfort, a conducive home environment where he was fed and had lots of fun with new-found friends.

Andy previously could not get along well with the other children in the centre and often reacted in rage uncontrollably when provoked, getting into fights with them. He would also turn to self-harm as well as hitting himself on the head whenever he was in a rage. He hated reading, homework and anything that was academic related. Due to his struggles, he believed that he was an underachiever, not having the ability to excel in his studies.

Under the nurturing and holistic care of the staff at MightyKFC, Andy learnt to take control of his emotions and be responsible for his actions and behaviour. He has also grown to be academically more inclined and has undertaken the role of being a big brother to the younger kids, assisting the staff in the process.

The Andy of today reflects a very different disposition to that of the former. He is cheerful and respectful. Even his school counsellor noticed the improvement in Andy's socio-emotional well-being.

Andy shared his appreciation of our help saying, "Coming to MightyKFC has made a positive difference in my life! With the patient coaching and loving encouragement from the staff and friends at MightyKFC, I have improved in my studies and am no longer the lonely and angry person I used to be."

Motivating Mighty Minds

One of the concerns of parents is the poor academic performance of their children



which they are unable to help due to their own limited literacy level. Student volunteers from NYGH provided weekly academic coaching and motivate them to study hard for a brighter future and to break out of the poverty cycle.

The youths are guided on personal effectiveness and taught to set SMART goals. They are encouraged to build resilience, stay focus and excel.

Character building and values impartation are learnt through mentoring and social activities.



Using Mighty Hands





Creative arts including balloon sculpting are used as a way of therapeutic expression to meet the physical, social and emotional needs of the children.



More than just fun with rhythm and beats, music enables them to express their feelings and enhances their audio and movement coordination skills. Getting the children to do the mural painting on the Café wall instills a sense of belonging at the centre.



Imparting Lifeskills



Visual and digital art is another lifeskill imparted to 8 MightyKFC children who signed up to make three SG50 short films, beginning with script writing, directing and acting out the story. They also learn about lighting in production, and how to handle the camera for shooting the video, editing and putting in background music. It was an empowering experience of learning from professionals as well as relating socially and teamworking with 9 other children from across LCSS's programs.

Such invaluable experience builds up the children in their self-confidence, discipline, teamwork, creativity and determination as well as learning from peers. Parents were invited to 2 public screening of the short films produced by their children. The children were glowing with pride and a sense of achievement as they went forward to receive their awards amidst enthusiastic clapping from the audience.

MightyKFC organized a family bonding event for 16 families covering 32 children in collaboration with 10 volunteers from NUS. Mother and child switch roles as the mothers get to eat pizzas prepared and baked by their children.



Then mother and child paired off to a treasure hunt looking for heart-shaped tokens which they painted & decorated together. All had fun and enjoyed themselves. Prizes were awarded to 3 unique designs. Each family also brought home a bag of groceries, sponsored by SLNG.



f. CONNECTING WITH COMMUNITY



Besides reaching out to empower the disadvantaged children, our MightyKFC program also serves as a platform for volunteerism. In our Community Day, we are glad to create opportunities for 14 organisations comprising 104 volunteers from different walks of life to come together to bring joy to another community.

It was really heart-warming to see so many families coming down for this community carnival to have fun, play and laugh together. Everyone from child to grandparents had a great time together. What a fantastic sense of community spirit as more than 300 people gather together at our MightyKFC centre to interact with one another.

g. VALUED SUPPORTING PARTNERS

MightyKFC has strong partnership and collaboration with schools and corporations. 40 students from NYGH did their service learning project at our centre for 7 months. Their eyes were opened to see the struggles and real needs of the less privileged. They were very much enriched from befriending and interacting with our latchkey children from diverse background.

1.3.3 EDUGROW FOR BRIGHTER TOMORROWS


a. Summary

Intergenerational transmission of poverty can result in pronounced deficits of various developmental resources, in turn perpetuating their very cause – poverty itself. To break this mutually reinforcing cycle and reverse the decline of social mobility in Singapore, there exists a need to grow the aspirational, character, educational, financial, and relational capital of the vulnerable children in our midst.

Since 2015, Life Community Services Society (LCSS) embarked on its fifth programme, EduGrow for Brighter Tomorrows (EduGrow). The programme focuses on developing children from lower income families in Marine Parade, supporting them holistically and giving them a leg up in life.

b. Programme Pillars

EduGrow adopts a holistic, wide-ranging approach to tackling the challenge of social mobility. In addition to activities and workshops, it is at its core relational – i.e. community mentors working in close partnership with the children and their families to improve five key capital domains:

c. Partnering with WeCare@MarineParade

EduGrow is a collaborative effort between LCSS and WeCare@MarineParade (WeCare), a community enabling network that aims to help vulnerable residents in Marine Parade through community action and partnerships.

As part of the collaboration, WeCare contributed its extensive familiarity with the Marine Parade district, as well as its existing relationships with various community agencies, to identify vulnerable children for the programme, connect them with complementary support services, and provide suitable venues for regular activities. It also took on the role of programme developer for the children.

LCSS contributed its expertise in volunteer management to recruit, train, and support the community mentors, more details in section (d) below. In addition to supporting the programme participants in the various activities, it also served as the coordinating node for mentoring sessions and for the channelling of ongoing feedback.

d. Partnering with the Community

Community Mentors


Community Mentors are key to the children's success in the programme. 40 mentors were recruited and trained to journey with the children and their families through a supportive relationship, reinforce learnings from the various programme activities, and contribute to the ongoing development of the programme.

Recruitment & Selection: Community Mentors come from all walks of life and were recruited through a Mentors' Conversation and roadshows in Marine Parade. They were selected based on suitability after meeting with the staff. An Orientation and Foundation Programme (OFP) was designed to better prepare and equip mentors with practical skills and knowledge for the start of their mentoring journey.

Matching: LCSS and WeCare work closely with the families and Community Mentors to ensure, as far as is possible, goodness of fit between mentors and mentees.

Support & Development: Quarterly Mentor Coaching Sessions are conducted to support and develop mentors in their mentoring role. Topics covered include child development. To ensure delivery of targeted and effective coaching programmes, as well as identify further development needs, mentors and staff practise a culture of open and ongoing feedback.



f. Client Profile

The pilot run saw EduGrow reaching out to 28 pre-school and primary school children from across 24 lower income families in Marine Parade. They were identified based on a range of criteria, including household income and willingness to actively participate.



g. Outcomes

As the pilot run of EduGrow is currently ongoing, no major outcomes have yet been ascertained. Qualitative, ongoing feedback from mentors indicates high levels of engagement and positivity in the mentoring relationships. Feedback from families also indicates high levels of receptiveness and appreciation toward the programme.

Some problematic areas include irregular attendance for Group Academic Coaching, as well as the perennial challenge of effective mentor-mentee matching and scheduling of mentoring sessions.

At the end of the pilot run, a careful and thorough study will be conducted to evaluate the success of the programme in meeting its objectives, as well as identify areas and solutions for further improvement.

h. The Way Forward

EduGrow for Brighter Tomorrows will begin as a three-year pilot project (between 2015 and 2018) for lower income families in Marine Parade. If successful, it will evolve into an eight-year programme replicable in other districts in Singapore.

The EduGrow team has already begun thinking about the next phase of the programme's development. The current partnership arrangement between LCSS and WeCare looks set to continue as a means of tapping on both organisations' respective strengths and expertise in service of the Marine Parade district.

For EduGrow to be truly impactful requires a combination of reach and quality. The ability of the programme to appeal to greater numbers of lower income families, along with its ability to attract high quality volunteer mentors, are two critical factors for its longer-term future.

Should the EduGrow pilot prove successful, the team will also need to think carefully about expanding and adapting the programme to other vulnerable districts across Singapore. This will require a strong network of community partners, each based in and possessing a good knowledge of particular regions and demographies, able to mobilise ground support and capable of implementing the various programme pillars in timely and effective ways.

1.3.4 LIFE STUDENT CARE



a. Centre Enrolment as at 31st March 2016

Life Student Care (LSC) reaches out to primary school children in the community regardless of race, language or religion by rendering affordable quality before and after school student care services.

As at 31st March 2016, there is a total enrolment of 381 students from the 4 Centres, an increase of 2% from last year.

c. Benevolent Expense Recipients

A total of \$4,755 has been disbursed to 31 needy students on top of ComCare's subsidies given to lower income families at our 4 Student Care Centres.

d. ICU Programme

We supported 3 children from Life Student Care under this programme for the period March to December. Out of the 3 children, 1 Primary 6 child has made progress in their academic studies under the 1 on 1 tutorship of a tutor coach. The other 2 children started later around Aug, hence results were not visible. From February to March, we supported 3 at-risk children to keep them engaged at the Centre.

e. Intern Counsellors

Two intern counsellors were recruited to support the children. Our counsellor has counselled an average of 14 children per month from January to April 2015. Another counsellor has counselled an average of 5 children per month from September 2015 to March 2016

f. Programme

Our mission in LSC is to provide quality student care services to primary school children by focusing on the total development of the child in a safe and caring environment. At LSC, we endeavour to give the children a holistic "SPICES" programme with activities focusing on the Social, Physical, Intellectual, Creative, Emotional and Spiritual (moral) aspects of well-being.

g. LSC Highlights for Reporting Year

o Appreciation feedback from parents of our LSC children

Obtained good Coaching from teacher

I am happy that I chose Life Student Care, and the service provided is good. I would like to express my gratitude to Teacher Sarah, who coaches my daughter.
